Letter of the Month

Never Give Up

All ye Travellers and Gypsies in jail, I'm an Irish Traveller at HMP Wandsworth. I came to prison with my two brothers in law. The first day we had exercise out in the yard, me and a few Travellers were chatting about what we were gonna try to do while we're here. Some said they wanted a gardening course, two of the lads said they were gonna do nothing to which we all laughed.

I knew what I wanted to do and that was to become a Travellers Rep, to help those who can't read or write, get them work, help them with any problems they may have. It all sounds so easy but when you're a Traveller it's so hard to get what you want in here. I must have put in 15-20 apps for myself and others to change to W3 [the Irish Traveller /Gypsy ethnic Code] and you would laugh how long it has taken for it to change. But four months later, I've never given up.

Four months later they gave me the job of equality rep saying that Traveller reps doesn't exist here. Of course they don't exist.

'Are you white Irish or white British?' Where's the box you can tick for W3? So are we ashamed to be Travellers or Gypsies? Next time they ask, say I'm W3 and proud!

Here at Wandsworth I'm the Rep and as you can tell it wasn't easy for me to get it. I'm hoping to be the first person to get a Traveller and Gypsy group going out here. Hopefully they will see we are not just a number in here and might give us a chance to progress while here. **So boys don't**

If you don't have a rep why not you or one of the other lads put in to be a Traveller and Gypsy rep. Make sure you don't give up in trying, it took me four months and hopefully it won't take you as long as me. It is possible for me to get a red band which means I can walk around the prison to see what Travellers and Gypsies need help.

Boys, I was one of those who thought I could beat the system. I done twenty months at Isis there wasn't a day goes by where me and my friend didn't get into some trouble.

If the alarm went off, it was probably me. Out of the twenty months in there I done over seven months in the block.

I got out of there in April 2012. I didn't write this letter to make me look like I'm Mr. Hard. Just to help you so you don't go through what I went through, the hard way, it ain't worth it in the long run. You miss out on a lot outside.

But at the time I was a single man. Now it's different, I have a beautiful wife to go home to. So if the system or officers goes wrong I just bite my tongue because I want out of here.

Peace out lads, your time will come. Thank ye all for reading this and a big thank you to Breda Power, C. A. and my wife for helping me achieve what I have done.

Government Plan to Re-define Who Is a Gypsy or Traveller

Gypsy and Traveller groups are forcefully responding to the Government's proposal to redefine who can be considered a Gypsy or Traveller for the purposes of meeting obligations under planning law.

A new Government consultation paper on Planning and Travellers from the Department for Communities and Local Government (DCLG) proposes to redefine what a Traveller or Gypsy is. According to the proposals, Gypsies and Travellers stop being Gypsies or Travellers, and therefore cease to have specific rights if they cannot prove they follow a nomadic (travelling) lifestyle.

If Travellers keep moving, they qualify to rest on a permanent site. If, on the other hand, they have settled (and the reasons for this could range from child care, ill health or to care for an elderly relative), then they are no longer 'Travellers' and the Government and councils have no duties to them.

The London Gypsy and Traveller Unit launched the 'We STILL Count' Campaign, calling on Gypsies and Travellers to make themselves aware of the redefinition. The Government's consultation on planning policy proposals ended on 23rd November 2014.

Appleby Day At HMP The Mount

Appleby Day was a day of celebration during Gypsy and Traveller month here at The Mount held on 26th June 2014. Held in the chapel there was a good turn out to celebrate our culture and way of life.

I and all those present were pleasantly surprised at all the time and effort put into making this day possible for us all to enjoy by Mr Hardaker and C.M. Elgar and our thanks go to them both.

Becky Taylor, a lecturer at Birkbeck University in London who has researched our past and present and is author of many books which give an accurate account of our people.

Becky explained about the adversity and hardships faced by Gypsy and Irish Travellers throughout their lives, from the very beginning of our ancient ancestors to the present day. She showed a great deal of empathy towards our people. Our constant struggle in the world was highlighted.

Irish, English, Scottish and Welsh Travellers are different races of people yet, we walk the same paths as Gypsy people. We bare the same scars and live a similar way of life as free spirited, free-born people, proud of who we are. Our nomadic way of life, moving freely from place to place to find work is outside the conventions of other people. After the talk, lunch was served.

A fine meal, cooked to perfection by the chef and staff of the prison kitchen. The traditional feast of spuds, cabbage and boiled bacon was very much appreciated and gratefully received by all.

Traveller Movement Annual Conference

Padraig Mac Lochlainn, Member of the Irish Parliament and Sinn Fein Spokesperson on Justice, Equality and Defence, was one of the impressive line-up of speakers at speaking at the Traveller Movement Annual Conference held recently in London.

Mac Lochlainn who grew up in a Traveller family and was raised by his mother and grandmother who he describes as "two strong, loving Traveller women".

MacLochlainn said that all parties in Ireland were starting to acknowledge the distinct culture of Travellers and we all need to "support our people to stand tall as a strong part of society".

Traveller Ethnicity to be Recognised in Ireland

Traveller ethnicity is finally to be recognised in Ireland according to Aodhán Ó Riordáin the Minister of State for Equality in the Republic of Ireland.

The recommendation for change came after a long campaign by Travellers for such recognition which was supported by human rights organisations, including the United Nations and the Irish Human Rights Commission.

“Irish Travellers have ethnic status in Northern Ireland, they have ethnic status in Britain and I think it’s a requirement. The world community is looking at us now and at what we are doing in our own country. I think it is possibly one of the greatest things we can do to finally celebrate and acknowledge the rich and vibrant culture that the Traveller community have in Ireland and to begin to build bridges between Traveller people and settled people. It will also be a challenge to the Traveller community to bring the positive nature of their community to the fore. I think we can do that together,” said Mr Ó Riordáin.

Profile: Thomas McCann

Thomas McCann grew up in the first Traveller site at Labre Park, Ballyfermot, Dublin in the 1960s. He attended, like everyone else he knew, an all-Traveller school, which was ‘not bad, but I didn’t learn much’.

Like everyone else, he left at 13 to join his father in trading for scrap and horses. There he might have continued, but what changed things was the Tallaght by-pass. Vigilantes decided to keep Travellers out of the area: ‘big men, heavies, set up road blocks. Trailers were burned. The police did nothing’. Thirteen of us were refused in a pub, so we sat down and we were all arrested. We spent the weekend in Bridewell police station. A funny feature of these events was that whenever Travellers were discriminated against and complained, we were always the people who were arrested. When we once organised a protest, the police turned out in full riot gear’.

Thomas became involved in Traveller education and community projects. As a result of this he enlisted on a community work course at the National University of Ireland, Maynooth. Following this he became a youth and community worker for Dublin Travellers Education and Development Group.

With an amazing sense of timing, Thomas then took time out to travel to Eastern Europe in 1989, the year of revolutions, on to China by train on a \$29 fare and then to Hong Kong where he worked in a travel agency and in the film industry.

Returning to Ireland, Thomas started a Business, Economic and Social Studies course in Dublin University (Trinity College), a course he loved, with ‘great lectures’ and learning statistics. He moved on to work for the Irish Traveller Movement (ITM) for a long spell. During his time there (1993-2005) it grew from just a few groups to more

than 80 and became the national representative organisation for Travellers.

He then began to pursue an interest in counselling, starting with a foundational course at the Tivoli Institute and finished a Master’s degree in clinical supervision at Dublin University (Trinity College). This led to the founding of the **Traveller Counselling Service**.

Thomas has long had an interest in culturally inclusive counselling and was convinced of the need for a service for Travellers, one which Travellers could trust. The service is now well established and expanding. The Traveller Counselling Service has a team of six psychotherapists managed by Thomas.

Looking at the past years, Thomas points to the achievements of Traveller community development as a means of organising and mobilizing people to create change, but is disappointed with ‘policies and structures not implemented and the law going backward. The state may concede the policies and structures, but lacks the resolve to implement them.’

Significantly, Thomas says a ‘fully engaged Traveller Community can make that happen.’



Traveller Probation Report Published

The Traveller Equality Project has published a new report to improve practice for Gypsies and Irish Travellers engaged with Probation. The aim of the report is to provide probation staff with greater understanding of Travellers in order that both Travellers engaged with probation and probation staff can benefit.

The report's author Joe Cottrell-Boyce said that 'a key to many of the problems that arise are about understanding – Probation staff understanding Travellers and also Traveller understanding what Probation staff have to do.' The report was undertaken in partnership with Thames Valley Probation. Fury and Saunders on Top of The World


Saturday, 29th November was a good night for the Travelling Community and not a bad night for boxing, as a loud gathering of nearly 20,000 fans willing to miss their last train home stayed in the hall into the small hours as their champions Billy Joe Saunders and Tyson Fury held off challengers to their unbeaten records and world title ambitions.

Thomas McCarthy Launches Second Album



London-based Irish Traveller, Thomas McCarthy has launched his second album, 'Herself and Myself'. The reviews of the album have been fantastic. One review stated: 'The majesty and control of his singing here is something to ponder on. It is full of the high decoration that we associate with the best of the Irish tradition and then on held notes he employs an easy vibrato. Technically, it is singing of the very highest quality.'

'The album title comes from the opening track, but Thomas is also referring to his mother and singing teacher who was also his source for a number of items here. The album ends with one delightful example of Mary McCarthy's singing. From this it is possible to hear the stylistic source of Thomas's singing.'



Tyson Fury defeats Dereck Chisora

Fury, switching from orthodox to southpaw, virtually strolled through 10 one-sided rounds before Dereck Chisora decided he had taken enough punishment - an ending that was greeted with unhappiness as fans left the arena. Fury won way more easily than when they met three years ago, and securing the vacant European title puts him just a few months of hard negotiating away from challenging the best heavyweight in the world, Wladimir Klitschko.

Billy Joe Defeats Eubank

Billy Joe Saunders survived the late charge of Chris Eubank Jr to keep his British, European and Commonwealth titles. Billy Joe now looks forward to fighting fellow Traveller, Andy Lee, who defeated Matt Koborov in Las Vegas on 13th December, for a WBO version of the world title. The fight built slowly and ended in fierce exchanges, with the result in the balance until the final seconds, as Saunders, exhausted, dug deep to hold the challenger at bay.



Eubank might well be a world champion one day but he was not quite good enough last night. He will come again, much better for this experience. Had he boxed in the first half of the contest like he did in the second half, he might be admiring the British, European and Commonwealth middleweight titles – but he learned that posing like his father once did can be a costly business. From the moment he vaulted the ropes - like his father, Junior wanted to play mind games. Saunders kept his cool, though, as his opponent went into full Eubank pose.

Saunders did not land a single blow capable of stopping his opponent but he took quite a few himself that threatened his titles in the final few rounds. Eubank's strategy appeared to be watch, wait, watch some more then lunge and dip low to avoid the counter. It was not pretty and it was bringing him joy. By the end of the fourth, he'd given up staring down Saunders on the bell.

The fight was very tight, with neither fighter seizing the lead which did not make for much of a spectacle early on. They continued their grab-and-smash into the eighth, with more missing than landing from either side - although Eubank, swinging more freely, caught Saunders on the ropes with some heavy shots to the ribs. There was nothing in it going into the final two rounds, but Saunders needed to stop the barrage coming his way.

With his mouth open and his nose bleeding, Saunders shipped huge left hooks and uppercuts in the final round, as well as one crunching right cross, but he was still there.

Proud and unbeaten, Saunders raised his hands at the end, but looked mighty tired.
